
FLOOD PRECAUTIONS IN SHALFORD

Now that memories of our glorious Summer have faded and the rainy season is with us again, it's time to look at potential flood protection.

Shalford now has a supply of sandbags from the BDC available for villagers' use during times of flood, the bags are stored in the gateway entrance to Tanner's Yard, (courtesy of Mr Alex Tanner) in front of the Police Station.

Watercourseswho is responsible for what?

The Environment Agency is responsible for the management of main rivers and is the supervising authority.



Lets hope we don't have to face such flood hazards this Winter!

BDC has "Permissive Powers" through the Land Drainage Act 1991 and Owners of land through which a watercourse flows have certain riparian rights and responsibilities and these are based on common law. Clarification of these can be obtained from the Environment Agency or the BDC.

Householders are responsible for keeping any ditches or pipes on their land clear of obstruction so that the flow of water is not impeded. It is important to check that in the event of flooding water can get away without affecting others.

These are the broad outlines of rights and responsibilities, more detailed information on these is contained in a booklet "Living on the Edge" obtainable free from BDC.

BDC are aware that an area in Churchend has had flooding problems and will carry out further investigations as to the cause in the near future.

New Bus Service

An independent, privately operated mini-bus service is proposed to start in January 2004 from Shalford, Jaspers Green, Panfield and Braintree for children attending various schools in Colchester.

Chiropody Clinic.... the final cut

Sadly, after almost 15 years the NHS, because of lack of funds, has closed the Shalford chiropody clinic.

The surgery, was set up within the village hall after generous villagers raised enough money in a day-long fund raising to provide a small room, partitioned off from the main hall, and all the necessary equipment for a visiting NHS chiropodist.. The clinic, which catered for the older residents of Shalford and Beazley End, Blackmore End, Panfield, Rayne, The Salings and Wethersfield, was run entirely by volunteers.

The NHS service was free, but patients when they attended the clinic were invited to make a small financial contribution to off set the clinic's modest running costs. The VPMC charged a small amount to cover the rent and heating costs on the mornings when the clinic was in use.

The volunteers arranged appointments for treatment, organised transport if it was needed, served cups of tea/coffee to the patients with whom they were ever ready to have a chat and if required offer assistance. The clinic was a real social service!

by the late Sonny Hastings, and the other equipment, purchased over the years out of clinic funds, were a chiropody drill, an overhead magnifier/lamp and instrument trolley. All of these items have now been offered to and accepted by the Freshwell Health Centre in Finchingfield and it is satisfying to know that this equipment will still be used in the surgery for the benefit of patients.

At the clinic's closure there was just over £200 left in the bank account and this money has been donated to the CREAMER Fund, the Bendlowe Trust and Shalford Village Hall Management Committee.

NEED A LITTLE EXERCISE OR A BREATH OF AIR, POST CHRISTMAS?

TRY A CIRCULAR WALK FROM THE VILLAGE HALL

(Takes about an hour at a brisk pace. Please keep to the paths and put dogs on a lead, especially across open farmland. Suggest wearing walking shoes or boots, it could be muddy in places.)

1 Cross road in front of the Village Hall TR walk along grass verge 100yards approx towards Braintree. TL at first turning towards Nichols Farm.

2 At end of lane, fork right, keep barn on LH side. Strike out directly ahead across open field towards Iron Bridge Farm, (100yards approx) keep hedge on LH side.

3 Follow this headland path to Iron Bridge Lane. TL past Iron Bridge Farm, pass through old farm gate into grazing pasture.

4 Keep hedge immediately on RH, walk 200 yards approx ahead to pass through gate in corner of field

5.Walk ahead along riverbank until Water Hall Lane.

(TO SHORTEN THE WALK HERE, TL along lane to main road, turn left up hill back to Village Hall).

6 TR across bridge, follow lane for 200 yards approx. TL on signed footpath immediately past the Priest House, walk along farm drive, through farm gate into stable yard

7.Cross stile immediately in front, follow grass track for 100 yards approx. Cross to another stile.

8 Walk ahead in field for 100 yards approx, cross broken stile in hedgerow on right. TL immediately, follow hedge for short way, then keep straight on across field towards Shalford Hall.


9 Cross stile, over river footbridge, TR immediately along riverbank. Pass fishing ponds on L in 100yards approx. TL immediately alongside new wire fence.

10 Cross stile into rear of churchyard, walk through churchyard, keep church on LH. Go through lychgate in front main church door, into farmyard.

11Cross yard, head towards brick wall (on L) of Shalford Hall. Follow path ahead along wire fence to Water Hall Lane.

12 TR in lane to main road, TL up hill back to the Village Hall, or alternatively TR and visit "The George" for a well earned drink!

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ERIC RAVILIOUS, 1903-1942

Shalford, Great Bardfield and Castle Heddingham all have claims on Eric Ravilious, he is on the War Memorial in Shalford Church, cited as a founder member of the Bardfield Artists and is commemorated on a blue plaque in Castle Heddingham. But, who was Ravilious and for what is he famous? In short he was one of the most important illustrators and painters of the first half of the 20th Century and he was one of only two War artists to be killed on active service. Ravilious was born in Eastbourne and he studied at the Royal College of Art under Paul Nash (amongst others) where he made friends with Edward Bawden, another "future well-known local artist".

Before the War Ravilious and Bawden would come down to Bardfield because it was cheap living and remote from London. How times change! Around them gathered a nucleus of other artists, mostly between 1935 and 1955. In the early 50's the Bardfield artists would have annual Open days, which were always reported in the national press as major events on the British Art Scene.

Ravilious and Bawden were both designers, one of the strengths of the Bardfield Group was its contribution to printmak-




A head piece engraving for a 1933 press notebook.

ing. Cricket fans might be interested to know that Ravilious designed the decorations around the titles on the Wisden Cricket Almanac. He also painted in watercolours and his sparse dry watercolour technique suits his Essex landscapes and those of the South Downs. His

painting of "Hull's Mill" recently sold at auction by Sworders for £30,000, the painting was originally offered for sale at 12 guineas!

In Spring 1941 Ravilious, his wife

Tirzah, also an accomplished artist, and their three children moved to Iron Bridge Farm Shalford where he was to spend the last of his brief life when in England. The property was rented from John Stracey, M P, who suggested in a letter that the annual rent should be £70 in cash and £70 worth of paintings! This last home accounts for his name being on the Shalford War Memorial. Ravilious' legacy was an extraordinary collection of work, especially his wartime watercolours that create a haunting, lyrical record of his experiences that are quite devoid of violence. His delicate touch was inspired by the 19th Century watercolorist, Francis Towne, and perhaps in Ravilious' urge to follow in his footsteps to Iceland he requested a posting there. It was from here 1942 that whilst on a rescue mission his plane failed to return and he was, with others, declared, "missing presumed dead"

CALLING ALL DOG OWNERS

- Do you exercise your dog on the playing field?
- Do you allow your dog to foul this area?
- Do you clear up the mess if it does?
- Do you know that you can be prosecuted if you don't?
- Do you know there are two dog loo bins on the field?
- Do you know that dog mess can put children and adults at risk of becoming blind?

The VHMC is calling on all dog owners who use the playing field to exercise their pets, to clear up the mess should their dogs foul the ground. The BDC Dog Warden has visited the village to give advice on this problem. The field is primarily a sports' and children's recreation area and dog fouling is potentially a health hazard and unpleasant for everyone. To jog the memories of dog owners who have forgotten their public responsibilities the VHMC will display more signs around the area reminding them of the local by-law and the penalties which can be incurred by dog fouling. To help owners dispose of the messes two bright red dog loo bins are in place on the playing field. Another one has been recently sited on White's Hill Braintree Road, all are regularly emptied by the BDC.

Stepping Out?

Within a parish a network of well maintained footpaths is an asset. The responsibility for maintaining these ancient ways is shared by the Parish Council, landowners and ECC. The Parish Paths Partnership scheme, set up by Essex County Council, allows the PC to organise footpath grass cutting, and under this scheme the Parish Council submits an estimate for the season's cutting and when this is completed the cost is reimbursed by ECC. Farmers can choose to cut the paths on their land, and one farmer within this parish does so, Bob Bell, a grass-cutting

PEOPLE..... The Reverend John Shead

John Shead, who is married to Hilary and has three grown up children, was born in Ilford, and after being educated at the County High School Wanstead, and joining the RAF for National Service, he trained as a teacher.

John taught from 1970 until he resigned from his Headteacher post at Thaxted School in 1985, this was when he was appointed Curate at St Mary's Church, Saffron Walden, where he served for two years. Following his ordination in 1975 he had managed to combine his teaching job at Thaxted School with that of Honorary Curate at the Parish Church. In 1988 John was inducted as parish priest to Wethersfield and Shalford, and later the parishes of Finchingfield and Cornish Hall End were added.

Have you ever wondered what the Vicar does in between Sundays? If you imagine that all John does is just sit in his book-lined study thinking good thoughts and looking for something to do, you are wrong. He is constantly frustrated by never having quite



enough time to cover all the demands of a parish priest's duties. So much of his life is spent driving around his large rural patch, always having to travel in a rush from one appointment to another. Apart from Sundays when John's day is full, conducting services at his four parish churches, there is no particular pattern to the other weekdays except that he says Daily Offices, (short services of prayer) three times. Every week he takes a

school assembly at Wethersfield and Finchingfield, both Church of England schools, where as a Governor he also attends board meetings. Despite careful forward planning he has often to deal with matters as they arise, his schedules frequently changed at very short notice. Visiting sick parishioners at home and in hospital, answering the telephone, dealing with the four parishes mail and administrative work, seeing parishioners often listening to their problems, arranging baptisms, weddings and funerals, attending Diocesan and Parochial Parish Council meetings, preparing sermons, as well as putting in appearances at the villages' social and other functions leave him with little time for relaxation. Once a month at a group meeting he joins nine other priests, who support each other by worshipping together, talking through their parochial experiences and then later enjoy a pub lunch. Like several other priests John has a Spiritual Director and three or four sessions a year with him help John day-to-day in what can be an isolated rural life.

John finds his parish work very fulfilling, his deep faith sustains him; worship, particularly celebrating the Eucharist, is most important, as is the time he sets aside for prayer and study. Apart from having a deep-rooted Christian belief, he feels that being a good listener and an easy communicator are very necessary qualities for a priest, his wide experience of different types of people and their lives, prior to being ordained, has been of real value. John has a keen sense of humour and an appreciation of living life to the full, and he sums it all up by quoting a former Vicar of Thaxted with whom he worked and who said, "There's no point in religion if you can't enjoy it"
